## BRIDGE BYTES

.....By Ernie Retetagos



### THE SIMPLE SQUEEZE

A simple squeeze, as its name implies, is not that complicated. The most problematic aspect is just recognizing that the possibility of a squeeze exists. Clyde Love, in his classic book "Bridge Squeezes Complete", coined the acronym BLUE. The term BLUE identifies the essential ingredients for a successful squeeze.

**B** stands for one defender being busy guarding two suits. When that defender has the sole responsibility of protecting more than one suit, they can be squeezed. Sole protection could be in the form of length or high cards. If declarer holds A K x x x opposite x x x, only one defender can guard the suit. When declarer holds A J x in a suit, a defender with K Q has to protect that suit. The suits in which there is the possibility of gaining an extra trick are called the threat suits.

**L** is the ingredient of the squeeze over which declarer has the most control. You have to lose enough tricks early in the hand, so that you can cash all of the remaining tricks except for one. This is known as rectifying the count. Assume that you are in 3 no trump and can run 11 sure tricks. If you duck a trick, you will have rectified the count, and are in position to cash 11 out of the next 12 tricks. If a defender can be squeezed, you can pick up an extra trick. If you fail to duck a trick, the defender will have a spare card to discard at the critical time and will not be squeezed. If declarer is in a suit contract with a long suit and 10 tricks, you'd have to lose 2 tricks before running trumps. It has been said that long trumps should not sit idly in your hand.

**U** is having the upper hand or having a defender discard before the hand with the threats. If declarer does not have at least one of the threat suits sitting over the defender, declarer will have to make a critical discard before the defender. If both of declarer's threats are in the same hand, only the defender that has to discard first can be squeezed. When declarer has a threat in each hand, either defender can be squeezed.

**E** is having an entry to the hand with a threat suit. It's pretty clear that establishing a trick in the dummy doesn't help you if you can't get there to cash it. That is why sometimes the best defense to a squeeze is to attack entries.

In order to execute a squeeze, declarer just has to rectify the count, and run all the winners outside of the threat suits. This includes all side winners and long trumps. Prior to the last winner, declarer might want to cash a trick or two in a threat suit to simplify the position and avoid ambiguity. If the conditions are right, an opponent might be squeezed when the last winner is played. Usually declarer just has to keep track of the discards in one of the threat suits. If that suit doesn't yield an extra trick, try to cash out the other threat suit.

**NOTES FROM THE CLEVELAND REGIONAL:**

WARREN OBERFIELD, NPC.....by Craig Biddle

I had planned to play two days with Warren at the Cleveland Regional this past May. One of the games was for the Monday Swiss. After he died, Bernie Fudor and Fred Schenker found Asim Ulke as our 4th. So we met up Monday morning before game time, filled out our entry, and listed Warren as our NPC (non-playing Captain) on the entry. (Technically, this is illegal according to ACBL Policy, since many years ago some enterprising young players entered one of the major team events with a fictitious captain.) But nobody in the room would have objected to this.

An aside about Warren - he was both one of my favorite and most frustrating partners. I knew him from about 1970 until his death, and we played many sessions together. He was an extremely conservative player, which was my main frustration with him - bridge has become a game of pushing your opponents around, and he refused to adapt. We played 12-14 notrumps, and he was more likely to pass with 12 than open 1NT with 11.

When we sat down to play, I played with Fred and Bernie and Asim were at the other table. For our first match, We played a pair from London, Ontario, and at the other table Asim and Bernie played a young couple. When they came back to compare, Bernie sat down and said, "I never knew what was going on - they were all talking in Turkish!" We won a slugging match, 40-31 in 7 boards. The next match was a slam-bidding exercise for Fred and I vs. our seatmates, and we bid both, they only 1. In the third round Fred and I had a major defensive error, and let a vulnerable game through, but Fred played a game nicely to win most of that back, and then there was a board where Fred declared 1NT at our table, and Bernie 1NTx at the other. Both of them made an overtrick. Our table opponents also misjudged a 5-level auction, so we broke for lunch undefeated and leading the field with 79 of 90 VP's.

In the next match, we drew the Sulgrove team, although Don and Kathy sat out. On the first board, Fred opened 1H Vul in first seat, RHO bid a NV 2NT, and I was looking at S-1098xx HK108xxx D-x C-x. I looked at this hand, and decided that hearts were going to be trump. They let us out at 5H, which was the last making spot. At the other table, Fred's hand doubled 5D and beat it 1 trick. Then there were 3 boards in a row where we were plus at both tables, so we survived the board where I drove to a vulnerable game with 5 points after Fred overcalled a 1D opening with 1NT. (I was 6-4 in the red suits, but they were able to take the first 4 diamond tricks.)

In the 5th round, we played Ken Kranyak and Michael Creager; Bernie declared 3NT vul with club suit of Qx in hand and AJxxxxx in dummy. He took a finesse and lost to a singleton K. Down 4 and lose 14. But we preempted them out of a vul slam at our table, and stopped in a partial with a couple of promising hands; they bid 3NT at the other table and were down 2, and ended up winning the match by 3 IMPs. Our last two matches were carbon copies, losing one big swing and winning several medium ones. We finished the day 7-0 with 176 of a possible 210 VP's. **Warren would have been pleased.**

**Richard Katz 4S** It's match points, so I'm vulnerable and don't want to just collect my fifties. I bid four spades optimistically thinking ill make it, so there! Although pessimistically I may lose one heart, two diamonds, and three spades, so there!

**Gail Carns Dbl** if partner bids 4H I bid 4NT and hope partner does not think it is blackwood.

**Herb Sachs: Double** and bid 4NT over 4H;; I hope partner has a black suit and/or a share of the twelve missing points giving LHO AQJ of diamonds. Can't get worse than zero..

**Jack Hawthorne: Double.** I hate this one! I would probably double and hope partner can't find a call. But don't ask me what I'll do when the inevitable 4H comes back to me.

**Paul Caplan: 4nt** to play. double is for takeout and there is no good answer to 4 hearts by partner.

**Asim Ulke: I double.** Over 4H by partner I bid 4S and pray.

**Steve Nolan Double.** The pre-empt has put us under pressure, but that's not a reason to panic. Just live with the facts that stopping on a dime at the four level is out, and that this hand is good enough to bid at the 5-level in order to find the right strain. Follow up with a cue bid of 5D if partner, as expected, bids 4H.

**Bill Holt: Double.** I will double and pull Hearts to Spades. That shows Spades and clubs and good hand. With my diamond holding – and my Heart holding – I expect that is what will happen. If disastrous, it's only 1 board at matchpoints.

**Craig Biddle: Pass - Ugly prolem!** Partner is surely short in diamonds, but so is RHO. My guess is that we can make 4S about 40% of the time, 4H about 1/3 of the time, and 5C about 25% of the time. But It won't always be obvious for us which suit to make trump. And many of the layouts where we can make game, we will be able to do so in two or even 3 suits. Our most likely game is, probably, 4NT, but who plays that as natural? So I will just settle for my small plus and hope that the field is not finding a making game very often.

**Bob Zimmerman: pass.** Anything could be right. Anything could be wrong. If I double, I have to bid 4 spades over the inevitable 4 heart bid. We may or may not have a black suit fit. So, I'll take my +100 for average min: I am going to pass. If I double, it will be for takeout and partner will probably bid some number of hearts. If I bid 4NT it will also mean some form of takeout showing two five card suits out of the three unbid suits at MPs and play the next board.

**Chris Wang.** I am going to **pass.** If I double, it will be for takeout and partner will probably bid some number of hearts. If I bid 4NT it will also mean some form of takeout showing two five card suits out of the three unbid suits.

**Stan Ruskin: Double** Lot's of singletons and/or voids around the table and we can make anywhere from nothing to a grand slam so what do you do. In general, most people play that doubles of an opening bid at the 4 level are both takeout and cooperative so, if I double, partner could conceivably pass which would be fine or bid a suit which is also fine. If he bids 4H over a double, I would bid 4NT so he would now know that I have C and S and should also infer that I have D stopper. Partner can go from there. If partner bids 4S, I would probably bid 4NT which is key card in S (my double of 4D guarantees S). Thus, my bid is double.

**Ernie Retetagos: PASS.** If I was playing total point scoring, like IMPS or rubber bridge, I'd double and correct 4 Hearts to 4 Spades. Partner has a good chance of having either a 4 card black suit, or maybe a long strong heart suit. Although, even a 4-4 fit does not guarantee that we can make game. If partner doesn't have 4 spades, we are probably going minus. But we can't afford to exchange a good chance of plus 600 or 620 for a plus 150 on defense.

Matchpoint scoring is based on frequency, and is not quantitative. I'm guessing that bidding will lead to a minus score more that 50 % of the time. So I will pass take a plus, and hope that we don't have a game our way.

**Jane Marshall: PASS.** Surely we can set 4D, BUT Double would be takeout. Partner would not sit for a double and I can't pass 4H. My second choice is 4NT to show a 2-suiter, and correct hearts to spades. My answer is PASS.
