What do you lead?

Ernie Retetagos A. 4 Spades. Looks like 10 tricks. I can't imagine giving much serious consideration to anything else.

B. King of Spades. Minor suit leads are out. A heart could be the ninth trick. The King of spades might squash a stiff Jack or ten in dummy, and I'll need to discard on the diamonds. I can't hold all three suits.

Florine Walters: A 4D If we do buy this hand, it is more likely my partner has two or three diamonds rather than that holding in the Heart suit, which will encourage partner to compete over five Clubs. The other consideration is if West has a high spade honor in addition to a good Heart holding and I bid four Hearts, West might bid some number of NT. Fast forward to my partner on lead, even if I do manage to bid both suits--too much pressure on partner to lead the correct suit. The down side of my bidding four Diamonds is when partner does not compete, I am probably locked out of competing with the Heart suit.

partner for QJXX, JTX, X, JXXXX

Walters (Cont) **B.** Heart 8. Yes declarer most likely has all the missing Heart honors, but this auction allows partner to have some missing honor in a undisclosed suit and will be able to return a Heart before my hand gets squeezed.

Gail Carns: A. 4H I hope partner has 2 Hearts an SA if I bid 4S a club lead will make impossible for partner to get off the dummy. B. S4 I hope partner has QJ of spades and if declarer ducks a heart switch will defeat the contract

Jim Bachelder: A. Double, I play responsive through 4D. B. I am assuming that 3X is supposed to be 3D, so, my response is predicated on that. I'm leading the K of spades, playing partner for the Q. A H or a C will present declarer with their 9th trick. I'm playing declarer for : KXX, AXX, XXX, KXXX and

Herb Sachs: A 4D -whose hand is it? partner could have QJ10eighth x xxx x and six or seven spades is right; or AQJ seventh xx xx xx then you have to guess where to stop. as i will be on lead against clubs if defending i need help from from partner if i can get it so i bid four diamonds and listen real hard, if we bid one higher than necessary it is no tragedy but if we are outbid and they make we wont be able to explain

B can my partner have an entry and ten third of hearts i hope so and lead heart nine which should show 0 or 2 higher. how else can we beat this hand?

Bruce Keidan: A. 5S. Who knows who can make what. Let the opponents guess.

B. I do not want to lead. But since I must, small club.

Trudy Cohn: A I bid four spades on the first hand and l

B. Lead a low spade on the second

.PJ Prabhu: A. 4S. I like our chances for game. Being vulnerable, I can't afford not to bid game. 4H is a strong second choice. I decided to play pard to have AQJ of spades (or AQT and doubleton J with an opponent) than for Hs to split 2-2-3.

B. SK. S lead seems clear; but which one? I lead the K to protect partner's S entry.

Asim Ulke: I bid 4D. If partner bids 4S, I pass. If partner bids 4H, I bid 5C. If partner bids 5D, I gamble that partners has a singleton H and A, Q, J of spades and bid 6D.

B. KS. Opponents bid game after both passed. They probably have 6 tricks in diamond and east has hearts under control. Partner has 4 to 7 points and did not raise hearts. His/Her points must be in clubs and spades. What to lead is a toss-up between a club and a spade. I chose a spade and not any spade. I lead the king. I do not want to be under a 3 suit squeeze when they run the diamonds.

Steve Nolan : A. Pass. Nothing I bid will tell partner I have this hand. Instead, I'm going to take my best guess on the next round. There's a chance that it will be passed out but I don't think it will, and 4C by East is not necessarily a bad spot for us. B. Diamond 6. Aggression is out -- we're not going to set up a suit. A diamond lead is the least likely to give up an extra entry into declarer's hand.

Richard Katz:/A 4S—We think that is all we can make and don't anticipate opponents are going to bid again.

B. 4S I believe it's clear that I shouldn't lead anything except a spade. I chose the 4S because I feel it is a less complicated lead.

Bill Holt: A: 4S. 5S or 6S could be right but they could go down as well on cashing H tricks. Vulnerable, partner's suit should be pretty good. Probably going to buy a 5c call but I would be on lead and think I can beat that with two quick diamond tricks. B: Low Spade. I only have three but I need partner to contribute defensively and put a Heart through.

Stan Ruskin:A. I bid 4D with an ear to the table and plan to bid 5D later if they bid 5C. This is one of those hands that you never know whose hand it is, although I think it is ours. They could make 5C – 1 spade loser and 1 diamond user & there is a chance you could make 5D. At imps, you take the safe route which is 4D and then 5D if they persist with 5C. B. I lead 7D. Any other lead will probably give them a trick, which could be the 9th trick. This is the lease of evils. It sounds like the remaining heart honors are in their hands and a spade or club lead would most likely give them at least one trick.

Auxilliary Expert

Marvin Rulin A. 4S Hand A has lots of possibilities. If partner has AQJxxxx and a singleton heart slam is possible. i might start to investigate by cue bidding clubs but that would give opponents too much info. I would just take the conservative route and bid 4S. i don't think the bidding would end there. Hand B i would lead S6. partner can't have much but may have some values in spades. east seems to have my hearts well protected

PANEL: Thanks so much for taking the time to participate in what I consider to be an important learning experience for less experienced players. Your explanations give great insight into the thinking process that is so important in making bridge decisions. Having said that, I apologize for the typo of 3X. I knew you were all smart enough to know that the C is right next to the X!!!!
