AN INTERESTING HAND FOR YOU

A hand from a recent club game had the potential for some interesting bidding decisions. With both vulnerable South would deal and pass. West can choose between pass, 1 spade, or 2 spades. Most of the rationale for entering an auction is to get to your best contract when it's your hand, and/or making lead directing or interference bids when it's not. With these goals in mind, I would not consider passing.

S- Q 7

If West would pass, North would open 1 NT. South would bid 2 clubs and then bid 3 NT after North denies a major. This is the standard contract with 15 HCPs opposite 10. Most pairs were -100 on this hand, as 8 tricks in hearts or no trump are the limit.

Some pairs might open 2 spades with the West cards. I don't like to open a 2 bid in an early seat with cards in two side suits. In my opinion there is too much potential defense to preempt. If West does open 2 spades, it will probably go all pass for 100.

This is an easy 1 spade opener for most players. The 10 and 9 in spades and diamonds make this a non minimum hand. On this hand, you can make 7 tricks opposite only a Queen.

If West opens 1 spade, North should not even consider overcalling 1 NT without a stopper. Most North players would probably double, although there are a number of negatives. There is no shortness in spades, no 4 card major, forcing partner to the 2 level, and vulnerable. After a double, South might try 2 hearts, 3 hearts, or 1 NT. If North decides to pass over 1 spade, South would balance with 1 NT (10-11), and North would raise to 3. Notice that by bidding, West has created some problems for the opponents, and increased the opportunity for them to make a mistake.

Jack Hawthorne: 5D. I'm not sure about 4S if partner preferred to double 2H rather than O/C. If partner has a really good hand for spades (again, I doubt that), then I hope he reads 5D as forward going.

Stan Ruskin : 6S Sounds like partner has a strong 2 suiter. He probably has a 6 card spade suit, a heart void and either 4/3 or 5/2 in the other suits. He thinks that he can make 4S without anything from my hand. His other suit must be C so I'm guessing that holds something like at least AKxxxx and AKQxx or something like this. I can cover his D losers and fit his clubs. I think at the worst, he will have a play for the slam and could even have a laydown 7 or 6 contract. Please remember that he didn't make a 2 way Double of 4H so he has a strong playing hand. Thus, I bid 6S.

Richard Katz 5D Feel like I didn't bid 5 diamonds over four hearts, and that five diamonds now must be a spade "utz" giving partner an out at five spades if four spades was bid under pressure!! Punting, as usual! \

Gail Carns Pass I would have doubled 4H to say I had something then I would not have this problem

Herb Sachs: .. 5D I feel I owe my partner one bid (right or wrong). five diamonds. Partner did not bid four spades over two hearts. This is stronger in my opinion.

Asim Ulke: I bid 5D. I have a 9 loser hand. Partner needs a 3 loser hand to make slam in spades which is in the ballpark.

With a hand like AKQJXX X QXX AKX or AKQXXXX X QX AXX or AKQXXXX - XX AKXX we have a slam. With less partner would bid 5S which would be safe

Steve Nolan 5D. Passing is too timid after partner shows a very good hand with long spades, especially at IMPs, so I should look for a slam. I can do it either by taking the initiative myself with a bid of 4NT, or by leaving partner in the driver's seat by cue bidding. I think the latter is better because I will be able to describe my hand more precisely than partner would be able to do for me after Blackwood. In particular, if the bidding continues 5H by partner (showing a void), I can bid 5S to show tolerance for spades, and subsequently can bid 6D if partner cue bids 6C to show the club ace. Partner can then place the contract knowing everything there is to know about my hand.

Bill Holt: 5S. Partner ventured all alone and I have good values. I suspect he is void in H's with a big S suit and a club card. 5d might cause them to lead a killing club against 6S. If he is playing me for 7 highs, I have a smidgen more.

Bob Zimmerman: Pass. Non-vulnerable, partner's minimum looks to be something like [AKxxxx x xxx AQx] which might not even make 4. I'm going low.

Chris Wang. I am going to pass. I think partner has at least 6 spades and should be short (maybe even void) in hearts. I am afraid of a bad spade split with a possible spade loser and a possible club loser. So I don't want to try for slam.

Ernie Retetagos: 5 Diamonds. I think that partner could have either a 3 suiter with 5 good spades, or a one suited hand, too big for a direct 4 spade bid. A 5 diamond bid describes my hand, almost an opener with diamonds. It should be construed as a slam try, otherwise I would pass. No matter what hand my partner has, it includes the top black cards, and heart shortage. If I have diamonds, they can see that we have very few losers and will pick the right slam.

Trudy Cohn: I will bid 5 Diamonds which is a slam try in spades. Partner must have a hand that is close to a 2 opener or he would have bid 4 spades right away as I am a passed hand. I presume from the bidding that he is void in hearts and I may have the right cards for him. Trudy Cohn

Paul Caplan: 6 spades partner has a good hand. 6 spades should have a good chance.

Bernie Fudor: 5 diamonds seems right Inform your pd that have d control If 5sp goes down too bad

Jane Marshall: 4NT for keycards. I know partner has no more than 1 heart. He will show me his keycards and void (if he has a void in hearts). The correct number of keycards with the Queen of spades and a heart void is good enough for 7 spades. I guess I could say that I like my hand.

Phil Goulding: 5d. I bid 5 diamonds. Partner knows how strong he is and I have another trick beyond the ace so hopefully 5 spades is makable either way
