# BRIDGE BYTES .....By Ernie Retetagos



### HAND EVALUATION

There are numerous methods that can be used to help evaluate a hand's strength. High card points are the best indicator for balanced hands in no trump contracts. The most popular is the 4-3-2-1 method, but there are others. When you add in distributional points for unbalanced hands, there are several ways to count points for long or short suits. Losing trick count is a method that works pretty well when there is a trump fit. The down side is that A x x, K x x, and Q x x are all two loser suits. Another popular method is total tricks, which works best in competition. Players will typically use a combination of these bidding tools to help determine the final contract. Sometimes you don't need these bidding gadgets, because you have enough information that you can just envision partner's hand and count your tricks.

At a club game, the field had trouble with the following hand. S- A x x x x H---- D- A K x x x C- A x x. With neither side vulnerable, your partner surprises you by opening 2 spades in 1st seat. I would assume that partner has 6 spades headed by the King. Even if your opening 2 bids are undisciplined, card odds of 6 to 2 and the chance of a 1-1 split gives at least a 90 % chance of a no loser suit. Anytime partner has 3 hearts, you can count at least 12 tricks. With fewer than 3 hearts, partner might have 2 diamonds and the suit can probably be established for one or two extra winners. If partner has only one diamond, you would need a 4-3 split to establish an extra trick. If partner has 3 diamonds, the suit will probably provide at least one extra trick. The danger is that if partner has 3 small diamonds, and 2 clubs, and a club is led, you could lose a trick in each minor. When you add in the chance that partner might have a face card in one of the minors, it would take some very unlucky distribution not to have an excellent play for at least 12 tricks.

Once you decide that you are odds on for a slam, what should you bid? I can see a mild argument for a psych bid like 2NT or 3 clubs to give an opponent a chance to bid hearts and hopefully entice a favorable heart lead. I would just bid a strait forward 6 spades and be pretty surprised if it didn't make. Bidding gimmicks and the rule of this and that are numerical estimates to determine the value of your hand. There is no need to guess and play number games when you can envision partner's hand and place the contract accordingly. This time partner held S-K Q J x x x H- x x D- x x C- J 10 x. Even with the troublesome doubleton heart, a 4-2 diamond break held you to 12 tricks

**Arlene Port:** After looking at the answers by the "experts" in the book, the only thing I can offer in the way of a bid is that I will bid when it is my turn. What I will bid is a mystery to everyone reading this column and to me as well. I hope that half an answer is better than none?

**Jack Hawthorne**: A. **PASS**. I will probably have another chance to show my suits. B. Probably **PASS**. I might consider 2S, but it would be a "state of the match" decision.

A. WHAT DO YOU BID AT IMP'S? - B. WHAT DO YOU BID AT MATCHPOINTS?

**Richard Katz 1D** Losing count six. Two decent suits. I open one diamond imps/mp's. Not a surprise to make four spades opposite a passed hand. Why preempt ourselves?

Asim Ulke: I pass. If I open, I have to grossly overbid to get both suits in. I believe that West will open. I expect that the auction will go; club by West, pass by partner and 1 heart by east. Now I can bid 2 hearts to show spades and diamonds

**Bernie Fudor: 2D)**Tough problem. At Imps I bid 2 diamonds if no other reason than the lead. At mps I pass and take my chances that I can catch up later Happy Holidays

Paul Caplan: I would pass in both situations An opening bid promises some defensive values and this hand has none plus you can not show the distribution without showing more values than you have. It may be easier to bid your distribution on your next bid. opening this hand can lead to minus 800 fairly fast.

Steve Nolan .. IMPS: 2S. The more effective pre-empt. If the hand belongs to the opponents, they will already be in a game forcing sequence by the time I bid again, and my bid of 5D will make finding their best spot a guess. I prefer a weak two bid to a one bid because if I start at the one-level, I won't know what to do if partner later makes a penalty double. There's little chance of the bidding continuing all pass, so I'm not worried that we will miss a game of our own

Bill Holt: Pass at either form. I have shape, but not Quick Tricks. On an opponent's 1c-1H sequence I can show this hand easily, letting partner have some input based upon our fit.

Bob Zimmerman,2 spades. Nice problem. There is a slight chance I can steal the hand here, but far more likely the opponents will bid - and most likely they'll bid clubs. If I start with 2 diamonds, it will be harder to show my spades. So, I'll slightly mis-describe my shape to keep things a bit lower. I'll bid 3 diamonds over 2nt or 3 clubs. I'll pass any number of hearts.

Ernie Retetagos: One Diamond. I would bid one diamond at imps or matchpoints. Partner needs a spade fit and a red card to give us a shot at game. I don't want to take the chance that it might get passed out. The meaty spot cards make this look like a real opening bid.

Jane Marshall:. 1 Spade at IMPS and Matchpoints. 1 spade is more preemptive than 1 diamond and makes it more difficult for the opponents to enter the auction. Partner can use Drury if he has a limit raise in spades.

Herb Sachs: 3D I have to bid something and this bid doesn't promise anything. It's a great playing hand and no defense. If I get a chance I will bid the spades If opponent bids 4H over my bid, I think I will continue bidding the spades.

Stanley Ruskin: 3D This is very difficult and I'm guessing that the bids will be all over the board. My bid in either imps or match points is 3D. My next bid will be 3S or 4S depending on where the opponents are. Of course there is a slight chance that I could be playing in 3D and that is OK too. I have no idea where this hand is going but by bidding 3D and then some number of spades, my partner should know that I'm probably 6/5 (maybe 7/5) with no defense so he can take whatever action he wants, depending on the opponents bids.
