### COMBINE YOUR CHANCES

- 1) S- A Q 10 9 2 H- Q J 7 6 3 D- 10 5 C- Q  
S- K H- K 4 D- A Q J 8 6 4 C- A K J 6

In a club game last month, South was declarer in 6 NT. West led the Ace of hearts before shifting to a club. Declarer won the club on board, came to hand with the King of hearts, and cashed clubs. They discarded a diamond and two spades from dummy. Declarer led a spade to dummy and played the major suit winners. The Jack of spades didn't fall, and at trick twelve they took a losing diamond finesse.

Declarer's chances would have increased significantly if they dumped the King of hearts at trick one. With an extra dummy entry, declarer can unblock spades and test for Jack 3rd of spades, or 3-3 hearts( they were). The unblocking play can't cost, since you gain a spade trick even if you would lose a heart trick.

- 2) S- A K Q 6 5 H- K 6 5 D- K 7 2 C-J 5  
S- 4 H- A Q J 10 D- A 10 9 8 C- A Q 4 3

South received the nine of spades lead against their 6 NT contract. If either spades or diamonds can provide an extra trick, that would get you up to 11 tricks. A successful club finesse would make 12. Can you find a better way to combine your chances? The best line is to win the lead, come to hand with a heart and lead a club toward the Jack. If West hops up King, there are 12 tricks. If the Jack wins, switch back to spades to develop an extra trick.

If the Jack loses to the King, and a club comes back, there are numerous squeeze chances. Start by cashing four rounds of hearts. Depending on their discards, you will have the choice of several simple squeezes in addition to double squeeze possibilities. Lots of interesting variations, but at the table West hopped up with the King of clubs and declarer claimed.

## BIDDLE BITS by Craig Biddle

Most of you are by now itching to do something bridge-related. Fear not! There are dozens of ways to get your fix from your easy chair. A few of my favorites are: Bridge Base Online ([www.bridgebaseonline.com](http://www.bridgebaseonline.com)) – this is a free site which offers paid ACBL games around the clock. At any given time, there are thousands of players logged in from around the world.

There are also free tournaments, many of those are individuals, where you play with one robot and against 2 robots. Warning! The robots bid abominably. And their defense ranges from brilliant to totally insane, often on consecutive tricks.

Joining is free, you just assign yourself a user name and set a password and you are off. There are teaching materials – I highly recommend the “Learn Bridge” series of tutorials to those of you who are still learning the game. You can also kibitz world class players pretty much around the clock, and their vugraph app is almost always showing high level tournament play, often with commentary.

Some usernames for people from our unit: 1stPanda (me), bf06 (Bernie Fudor), mpg1000 (Phil Goulding), JBCoyle (Fred Schenker), printsus (Arlene Port), patapa (Pat Anders), burghboy (Bill Holt), raz3191 (Bob Zimmermann), ronfranck (guess), ALBuNy (Alan Leaver), jjfrac (Jim Fox), and JWHPGH (Jack Hawthorne). Some great people to kibitz – most any vugraph match from the US, England, South Africa, or Australia. And if you are fluent in other languages, there is a big Turkish community online and also frequent events from France, Germany, and the Far East. Individuals to kibitz include JEC (Jimmy Cayne, who has high-level team matches daily), rfp (Richard Pavlicek, who plays 24 board set games almost every night), and RalphK (Ralph Katz, who often practices with Nick Nickell in the evening).

[www.bridgewinners.com](http://www.bridgewinners.com) is a terrific site where you can read about many aspects of bridge, and where a lot of news from the world of bridge is posted. And you can post your own questions, too. I am a frequent poster there. Logins on this site are strongly encouraged to be your real name, and the site is heavily moderated, so be nice in your posts. You can always find something to read there, and there are multiple special-purpose forums that I seldom visit, too.

There are also useful tools for editing and saving convention cards, and a good search function that you can use if you want to research, say, Jacoby 2NT (warning, you will get a hundred or more hits on almost anything by now).

**Bob Zimmermann: 3 spades.** We're in a game forcing auction. Partner's 3 diamond cue bid could mean just about anything: an advanced cue bid in support of clubs, a stopper, asking for a stopper for NT, or just a waiting bid to get more information. Unless partner has a minor suit ace, 3nt will not play well. So, I'm not bidding 3nt. I'd like to have a third spade for this bid, but if partner's next bid is 3nt or 4clubs, I'll be off to the races. If he signs off in 4 spades, I'll respect that.

**Herb Sachs:** Four clubs and four spades over four hearts or four diamonds; Partner somewhere should be bidding key card Blackwood (holding KQxxxx AKX ? AJ(?)xx. Hopefully we can find a grand

**Gail Carns 4NT** Blackwood I don't see an option

**Jack Hawthorne: 3NT** I tend to treat cue bids like this as Western, and since this is match points, I'll bid 3NT, because I have a diamond stopper.

**Ernie Retetagos : 6 Clubs.** This problem resembles last month's problem. We probably have 12 tricks if we don't lose the 1st two. If partner has the Ace of diamonds, we could be off the A K of hearts. I won't bid 4NT, because East might double a 5 heart response. I'll bid 6 clubs, and my 2nd choice would be 3 hearts followed by 6 clubs

**Chris Wang:** I bid 3NT. My last chance to show a diamond stopper. I am not sure what partner's 3D bid means. Partner may want to bid on.

**Jane Marshall 3S.** A jump to 4S would be fast arrival, so 3S is forcing and encouraging. I don't want to bid 3H showing a partial heart stopper (looking for 3NT) because I have only 1 Diamond stopper

**Richard Katz 4NT** t sounds good, my favorite!  
5clubs: I pass  
5 diamonds: 0/3 already too high if 0, partner did bid three diamonds, therefore bid 7 clubs ( spade king inside )  
5 hearts: get piggy, bid 6 n t  
That's my ticket

**Asim Ulke** I bid 3S. I want to use key card blackwood for spades. If partner has both the K and Q of spades, than I want to be in notrump slam or grand slam.

**Bill Holt: 4d** Kickback. If clubs are agreed (per the conditions) I would rather Ace-ask at a lower level so we can play 4NT if I get a non-slammy answer. Partner could easily have an opener off the two Red aces here. Something such as KQxxx / KTx / x / AJxx.

**Bernie Fudor: 3NT**

**Paul Caplan -3NT** The most common treatment of the 3 diamond bid is to ask partner to bid 3nt with a diamond stopper. That is what I have. If you bid blackwood and get the 5D response you may be to high to recover. By bidding 3NT I tell partner that I have a good club suit, a diamond stopper and I do not have 3 spades. Partner still ha a chance to go on

**Reanette Frobouck: 4D** That is one tough problem. I think I would bid 4 D showing a D control and emphasizing my very good clubs and partner can take it from there.

**Craig Biddle 3NT** Hmm, there are a lot of things that are almost right. 3S should show real support, but AJ doubleton might be OK. 3NT shows a diamond stopper, but it's a shaky one. 4C is where I live, but 5C is only right if we are off the minor suit aces and partner has the SK and HAK. 4NT RKC just never works for clubs. 5C is even worse than 4C, since it denies extras and I have them. I'd bid 3S except that if partner now bids 4C I won't know if he's cue-bidding for spades or setting clubs as trumps So I'll bid 3NT, which will at least be a great matchpoint score if it makes.

**Stanley Ruskin 3S** It is a real problem. I rule out 4NT because we could be in the wrong game - this is match points- or even too high. Partners 3D bid could be just trying to get to 3NT if you have a D stopper or have a club fit and really good hand for you. In order to find out, I will bid 3S which will allow me to find out

**Trudy Cohn: 4C** confirming the suit as trump. If partner has the right hand, he can use Blackwood. Otherwise we will subside in 5 C. Don't want to get past a makable game

**Herb Sachs: Four clubs** and four spades over four hearts or four diamonds;Partner somewhere should be bidding key card Blackwood (holding KQxxxx AKX ? AJ(?)xx. Hopefully we can find a grand
